A Message From Fr. Tom



One Year Anniversary

It seems hard to believe but my first Sunday at Trinity was a year ago in November. I am amazed at how quickly this year has passed. When you start in a new place, you cannot really know what it's like, because churches will tell you one thing but then what they are is something different.

After this first year, I definitely have a greater sense of how Trinity is, and a sense of who you are. New people have also been coming in and have begun to get involved, and so Trinity is morphing into a new creation right here in our midst.

For my one year anniversary, I wanted to share what I see as some of Trinity's strengths:

The music is great. We are blessed to have David Lewis, April Snyder and now Lois Sivert, as well as a choir of great singers, accompanists, and other organists. David does a great job keeping people together, and every Sunday it's a delight to worship.

The community is friendly. Recently, a couple were visiting for the first time and I went to talk with them after the service but they were mobbed by others saying hi. I had to fight my way through to greet them, which is fantastic. We don't want to overwhelm newcomers, but I think extra attention is better than no attention at all. Trinity is genuinely welcoming.

The community is focused on service: When Mitchell Snow from Interfaith Community Services was here, he talked about Trinity's legacy as a founding member of Interfaith. And he talked about the ongoing commitment parishioners have to serve people, make sandwiches, and participate in good things. Trinity is a place of service, and that comes through in so many ways.

The Spirit is good. People are drawn to the worship, and I have gotten positive feedback about my preaching. People at Trinity are open to being inspired and moved by God, and people will attend opportunities for spiritual growth and community. The church is ready to go to where Jesus is leading us next. Jesus is here. I sense him everywhere at Trinity, and he's joyous, inspiring, comforting and loving. I sense him in the church, and I sense him in your lives.

There are a lot of other great things I could say about Trinity that I've discovered in the past year. These are just a few.

Where we go from here is not on to make major changes, but we go on to strengthen ministries which will continue to lead us forward. That means doing a better job with communications, to let the world know through social media what we are doing on Trinity and inviting people to join us. It means doing a better job of welcoming and incorporating newcomers, so they have encouragement to come back, and so they feel the great love we have for them. And it means helping all our ministry teams and groups be strong and able to keep growing. Ministry teams are the best way we connect people to each other and to the lifeblood of Jesus.

There is so much more I could share about this past year, but I will save it for subsequent Sundays. Please know how grateful I am to be part of Trinity, and grateful that all of you are part of our church.

And please pledge. Your pledge to Trinity is so important because it allows all of this to happen. And please come to church.

Meet Our Team of Organists

Trinity has been blessed with an abundance of fine musicians over the years and we have attracted a number of retired organists ... five of us actually. This is absolutely amazing considering that many churches cannot find anyone to play. This situation has led many places of worship to abandon their traditional music programs altogether. As I have been easing into retirement for years our Trinity organists have stepped up to the plate. Between the three of us who are still playing, Father Tom and our Senior Warden Leila, we have come up with a great plan to redistribute the work involved in making our services beautiful and well planned. All three of us will be playing each month, sharing Sunday duties. I will continue to direct, play twice a month, choose the music and organize the schedule. April will continue accompanying the choir and playing one service a month. She also does the regular copyright reporting. Lois will play once a month as she is able. What you need to know is

this: We are working with a single, set budget line item. In the past it has been labeled as "Organist/Choir Director". We now have a "team" doing these things. All of us will be paid for the work we do without impacting the budget at all. April has been on the staff since last March and Lois is volunteering her time but we are helping out with her "Uber" expenses so she can get to church to rehearse.

You should also know that per my request, I am not paid at all for the weeks or months that I am away, and April and Lois are doing most everything. That is how we can do all of this within the existing budget. I think this is a brilliant plan! You can imagine what a relief this has been and how very grateful I am for Trinity and all the wonderful people here. God has certainly given us a wealth of musical blessings.

Lois Sivert

Lois hails from a small farm in North Central Indiana where she began piano lessons at 6 yrs of age. She received a scholarship from Cincinnati Conservatory of Music to study piano and later transferred to Indiana University and studied with Walter Robert. She married James Sivert in 1965 who was a Television Producer for a local TV Station in Cadillac, Michigan. They moved to Rockford, Illinois in 1967, and in 1968 she began organ lessons with the organist of a large church they were attending at the time and was immediately given a job for Wednesday Night services.

From there, she studied with Naomi Rowley, a well-known editor and organist in the US. She encouraged Lois to get a Master's Degree in Organ/Piano. After spending time as a substitute, she ended up full time at a Lutheran Church in Rockford. During this time, she was teaching in a Public Arts School.

While trying to stay at home and raise two children, she was hired as an accompanist of a Boys' Choir and they traveled to Japan. The Director moved, so she

ended up their director and during this time traveled to England among many places in the US.

She was then hired as Musical Director at the largest Lutheran Church in Rockford. The membership was over 2500 and there were 4 pastors and 4 services a week. By then Lois had received a Master's Degree in Organ Performance from Northern Ill University.

Later her husband was transferred to Atlanta, Georgia and she served a couple of churches there and did a lot of teaching at an Academy of Arts. They came to California because both of their children live here. They originally came to a Retirement Home in Vista: All Saints Vista was close, and they discovered Lois was an organist so she began playing for services. They moved to Escondido in 2020. Her husband was very ill and passed away 2023. Lois says "Trinity was much closer to home here and I loved the music. I have also enjoyed listening and getting to know Father Tom. David and April welcomed me with open arms. I am enjoying being a part of the music community!"

April Snyder

April has been playing the piano since she was four years old and began accompanying choirs in high school when she lived in Pennsylvania. Moving to San Diego in 1960, she studied piano with Sherman Storr in La Jolla, Lyle Barbour in Escondido, Corinne du val Brewin (organist at the First Christian Church in La Jolla), Arthur Lambert at San Diego State, and Joanna Graudan at USC. She was Director of Music at Grace Anglican Church in Oceanside for nineteen

years before joining the staff at Trinity and has been the accompanist for The San Luis Rey Chorale for the past fifteen years. She has served Anglican, Roman Catholic, Methodist and Lutheran churches. April was a COBOL programmer for business and moved to Escondido in 2001 and has also worked for a large printing company. She describes herself as a dog person and a coffee hound! April also loves doing pencil puzzles and taking Sunday drives.

David Lewis

David has been the Organist and Choirmaster at Trinity Episcopal Church in Escondido since 2005. He has now been here for 20 years! He is a lifelong Episcopalian and has worked in several North County Churches. His debut as a musician was at the age of seven when he played the part of Lawrence Welk in a Sunday school play. Though his family is from Minnesota, they were living at the time in Philadelphia. He began taking piano lessons at age eight though he much preferred climbing trees to practicing. This is still true.

In 1961, when his father retired, the family moved to Vista where David and his dad both joined the church choir. In high school he formed a double quartet called "The Emanons". They won the award for "Best vocal ensemble" at the San Diego County 200th anniversary contest. He was the student conductor of the Vista High School Concert Choir. His first college music professor was our own Dr. Joe Stanford at Palomar College, in 1969. It has meant the world to David that Joe has been in our parish choir all these years

lending both his voice and constant encouragement. He was an organ student of James Weld at Palomar. David has his degree in Choral Conducting from California State University-San Diego and did graduate work with Sir David Willcocks of the Royal School of Music. He was stage and touring road manager for many years for the great and, at the time, controversial organist Virgil Fox. He is the co-founder and director of the San Luis Rey Chorale, now in its 46th year. He has taught music in the continuing education programs at Mira Costa College and for Cal State San Marcos. He is a frequent guest lecturer throughout North County.

Since Covid hit in 2020, he has had a thriving online music history and appreciation class held several times throughout the year. David has been trying to slide into retirement for the past four years so that he and Scott can travel more. He is so thrilled to have so many talented organists here at Trinity who are helping out.

The multitude of blessings which have flowed during this process has been amazing. Most moving for me has been the many, many neighborhood folks who have come by when I was sanding, painting and spreading chips to tell me how much this Little Pantry has meant to them over the years, how happy they are to see it put back in good shape, and how Trinity Episcopal Church has, in some cases, impacted their lives in a positive way. Also, in reaching out via Facebook for needed items (shingles, wood chips, etc.), I have been so uplifted by the generosity of neighbors and friends. The positive comments online have also been wonderful!

The most recent "angels among us" happened on Wednesday when I was there doing some painting. I had put the word out that we could use a small amount of wood chips to put around the base of the pantry. I did not divulge our location. All of a sudden, a giant truck pulled up with a huge mound of bagged wood chips. When I asked, "What's this?", the gentleman, Michael Hodson, responded, "It's for you guys! This church and Alanon saved my life, and I just really wanted to help out." So wonderful! A minute later as we were spreading chips, Leo from across the street came over and asked if he could help. He went and got

a rake, and the angels went to work. He spoke little English, but I did my pitch in Spanish for Trinity and our upcoming parking lot sale. People are good!

Since it's so important to give our kids opportunities to feel that they are so very important in the life of the church, I asked the Sunday school for their input. Grace came down to the Pantry with us and learned all about it. She came up with a color scheme and ideas for illustrations to put on the outside. This part of the project will be evolving as the kids give their input!

The Pantry is one way we can reach out to our neighbors and show we care. The sign reads (in Spanish and English) "Take what you need, leave what you can." Neighbors helping neighbors. Any church folks who want to put items in there, that is also welcome.

Unexpected Grace in Vienna

One morning, as Scott and I were walking behind Saint Stephen's Cathedral in Vienna, on the way to a house where Mozart had lived, I heard someone very sweetly singing hymns. I paid little attention and proceeded on. But this lovely soprano voice kept calling. Looking around, I saw a fairly well put together homeless woman sitting with her back to the cathedral wall. She looked kind of beatific with a long scarf over her head and shoulders. She did not look crazy or dirty or scary. So, I went over and sat down beside her. I have never done that in my life. I put a couple of euros in her tattered paper cup. Also, not something I usually do. I told her how lovely her singing voice was and how much I appreciated her music. She was most gracious and spoke perfect English. Not what I was expecting. Maria then began asking me about the deeper meaning of spirituality and God. Now I began to get nervous. I replied that I was definitely not the person she should be asking such things. She is a devout, life-long Roman Catholic and loves having deep conversations with priests. I complimented her English, and she told me her story of living in the US for many years and especially loved going to mass.

One thing led to another, and I asked where she attended mass. "Oh" she said ..."in Southern California, but you've never heard of it". Well, says I, I am from California too ... where were you"? She attended a new church called Saint Margaret's and really liked the priest, who would talk to her. "Oh, I said, there is a St.

Margaret's near our house ... where is it? In VISTA she said." Unbelievable ... amazing ... now I was really hooked. This church is two miles from our house in Vista. Vienna is 6,148 miles from there.

Years ago, she married a German man and moved to Germany. Then that relationship fell apart and so did Maria. I did not find out much more because at that part of her story she began to ramble and get quite confused ... like turning on a switch. I gave her a hug and wished her well. I got a huge, sweet smile in return. Later in the day, in the rain, I passed by her again. I don't think she recognized me. She was having a loud and in-depth conversation with no one I saw ... all in German. God perhaps. Then she began to sing again. This encounter really affected me and has changed the way I look at homeless people. Everyone has a story, and many are too far gone or scary to find it out. It was music that brought us together and brought Maria into reality from time to time.

OK ... now I am going to cry. This is happening to me a lot these days. On a related topic, while attending Evensong at Christ Church Cathedral in Dublin I discovered that they have a copy of a very famous bronze statue called "Homeless Jesus" by Canadian artist Timothy Schmalz. (Picture below.)

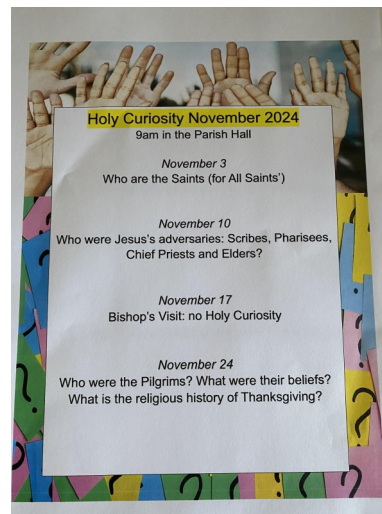

Haven/Turk Center House Dinner Ministry

November is a time for pausing to give thanks, to feel and express our gratitude for all the blessings of our lives. We truly do have lives of abundance. And I don't mean abundance of material things, although we certainly do have that in this country. We at Trinity have been thinking and talking a lot about abundance as we've moved through our season of stewardship. As volunteers in the Haven House/Turk Center Dinner Ministry, we're constantly reminded of the abundance we have as compared to many of our neighbors, in particular our neighbors who are experiencing homelessness. But what we also see in these neighbors is incredible resiliency and a strong desire to make better lives for themselves. All they need at this time of their lives, is a little help, encouragement, and compassion. Seeing this, talking with and learning the stories of the folks we serve at the shelter is one of the blessings that I am thankful for whenever I serve dinner at Haven House/Turk Center. It's not a "there but for the grace of God" sort of gratitude, but a thankfulness that I had the privilege of serving the shelter residents, of learning about them as neighbors, of giving them a little pleasure and fellowship, and most of all, of sharing a little of the abundance we have.

That's what it's all about, and the best reason to volunteer for the Haven House/Turk Center Dinner Ministry. I hope that in this season of thanksgiving, you will think about volunteering too.

For **November 2024** we will be serving dinner and providing dessert at the Turk Center **ONLY ONCE this month**, on the **second Thursday** of the month, **November 14**. We usually also serve on the last Thursday of the month. But in November the last Thursday is Thanksgiving Day, and ICS already provides a huge Thanksgiving feast for the shelter residents and ALL the various programs at ICS. So, we do

not have to provide service and dessert on Thanksgiving day. However, you can still volunteer for helping out at this ICS Thanksgiving dinner. I am not organizing this for Trinity, but you may volunteer by contacting the coordinator at Interfaith, Tommie Morrow. His email is tmorrow@interfaithservices.org

Mark your calendars for our dates in **December 2024**, which are **December 12 and December 26** (Boxing Day!). Watch for the sign-up notice to come out 5-6 days prior to the dinner date. Most of our "regulars" are on the distribution list for the Sign-Up sheet. You don't have to actually participate at all, but if you get the email, you'll have the option at least. You can't even consider signing up unless you receive the sign-up email, so please, contact me to add your email to the distribution! Plus, you'll be able to keep up with all the news and happenings in our Haven House/Turk Center dinner ministry.

Thank you to everyone at Trinity for continuing to support this very worthwhile Ministry, and most especially to our wonderful Volunteers! And a Blessed and Joyous Thanksgiving to you all!

From your Samaritan Team

It is hard to fathom that here in America, in the “land of plenty” people do not have enough to eat. 13.5% of the US population experienced food insecurity in 2023. In March of 2024, 25% of people in San Diego County were food insecure.

We at Trinity are trying to help. For many years parishioners at Trinity have been bringing food items for the food bank at Interfaith Community Services (ICS). In the four months Trinity has restarted making sack lunches for ICS, we have provided nearly 500 sack lunches for our hungry neighbors.

We have ongoing needs for the items we put in the sack lunches, soft granola bars, individual bags of chips, zip-lock sandwich bags, hair nets, latex free gloves. Monetary donations help us get the paper sacks and the small bottles of water that fit best in the

sacks. These can be dropped off at the Parish office Mon-Thurs mornings or brought to church on Sundays. Nonperishable food items for the Food Pantry can also be brought and we will make sure to get them to ICS.

We are partnering with the Daughters of the King to collect small personal hygiene items in a basket in the narthex. These are delivered to ICS to be made into kits for our homeless neighbors.

It takes a village and Trinity’s generosity is truly inspiring!

Vestry Update

On October 8, the Vestry met at Trinity. Fr. Tom announced that there would be a transition in the Office Administrator position, as Cesy Cruz had to unexpectedly resign from the position. He also reported that Sabrina Harris had begun working as the new bookkeeper. A buildings and grounds report was made, discussing the plans for work to address the black mold in the kitchen in the Parish Hall. Ron Smith shared that the planters in front of the church and the bank areas in front of the church are going to be landscaped thanks to a donation. The project of putting Wifi into the parish hall was introduced, along with a discussion led by Fr. Tom on how the Vestry makes decisions. It was left that the Vestry would get more information and proceed with knowledgeable members of the parish being asked to share

their opinions. Vestry transitions were discussed. Three members of the Vestry are stepping down at the end of the year, Gail Human, Tim Miley and Boatema Boateng. Wardens Leila Sackfield and Ron Smith have agreed to stay as Wardens for one more year. Fr. Tom proposed a leadership dinner on November 21st, to include Vestry members and other ministry leaders, which will give us an opportunity to support all the parish's ministry leaders and make plans for moving forward. The Treasurer's report showed annual expenses of \$241,492 compared to a budget of \$246,962 for the year to date. The Vestry was also alerted that after the Treasurer's report was made, an additional almost \$20,000 in pledges was received.
