A Message From Fr. Tom



Dwelling in Advent

Advent starts on December 1st. Advent is the season that marks the beginning of the church year, and it is a time, as you know, when the faithful are invited to prepare for the birth of Jesus.

This is my second Advent at Trinity. I am excited to let you know that we've got some great things planned this year,

including an activity with the Community Garden, an evening of lessons and carols, some time to be together in the middle of the week to pray and have fun and do something for our shut-ins, greening the church, and some other wonderful activities. It all builds up to our celebration of Christmas Eve at 7:00pm on December 24, and Christmas Day at 10:00am.

One of the things I am most excited about is exploring the four themes of Advent. These themes are **Hope**, **Peace**, **Joy** and **Love**. Each week during Advent, we will light one of the candles on the Advent wreath and celebrate one of these themes. We will discuss that theme in the Holy Curiosity meeting before church and will be part of our common prayers and my weekly reflection.

My hope is that you will feel encouraged to dwell in Hope, Peace, Joy and Love this month. Our faith encourages us not just to dwell in the rush of Christmas shopping, but to find encouragement to dwell in the holy. Here's what we will hear at church:

- **Be awake**, Jesus says on the first week of Advent. Do not dwell in the worries of this life. Your redemption draws near.
- Take off your garments of sorrow and affliction, says our second week of Advent. Do not dwell in these things but dwell forever in the beauty of the glory of God.
- Do not rest just in your self satisfaction and righteousness, says the third week of Advent, Dwell in the baptism of Jesus which will come with power and in justice.
- **Be prepared to live,** says the fourth week of Advent, not as you have lived, but live in the power of the child who is to come. He has done great things for us. He is merciful and strong, and he is here to lift the lowly and fill the hungry and remember us all with his mercy. Dwell in him.

These are great messages, and I look forward to exploring them with you week by week this December, and seeing how we might make Jesus our place to dwell, with his **hope** as a habitation for our hearts, his **peace** a gentle place for our minds to rest, his **Joy** an Advent home we can return to again and again, and his **love** leading us into his birth at Christmas.

God bless you, Happy Advent.

Advent Preparations

The Giving Tree - December 1st

On December 1st, the first Sunday in Advent, the Giving Tree will again be found in the narthex of the church. This has been a Trinity tradition for many years. Here's' how it works.

The tree is decorated with "ornaments", each one has an item that is needed by the people who depend on Interfaith Community Services printed on it. You can choose an item, take the ornament home and bring that item back. The gifts are NOT to be wrapped, as they are not Christmas presents. Just place them under the tree. If there is a need to designate who it is appropri-

ate for, please label it ... such as: men, women, children, for the home, etc. You will find that there are many inexpensive things like toothbrushes and razors, socks and underwear, as well as mid-range things like basic home supplies and maybe a few cleaning supplies. You can also attach the ornament tag to the item. Every year we are thrilled at the response to this program. The ornaments are refreshed now and then too, if you want to give more. The Greening of the Church - December 8th After Church

Trinity has beautiful Christmas decorations, but it takes many hands to get it all set up. We will have a "Greening of the church" event after church on Sunday, December 8th. We will get all the boxes down from the attic, set up the big Christmas tree, decorate the windows and the choir loft railing and put wreaths on the pulpit and lectern. Last but not least is setting up the lovely manger scene in front of the altar. Last year we got all of this done in just over an hour, with the help of many folks. We especially need a few younger people to help carry the stuff down from upstairs. This is a lot of fun, and we see the church transform. Please consider helping us out. We know what

The Advent Procession of Lessons & Carols - December 15th at 7:00pm

The mysterious and very moving service of music and Advent lessons is a tradition of Anglican churches throughout the world. It has been a staple of our Trinity Advent season for the past twenty years.

The service begins in total darkness with an ancient call to worship sung by the choir and followed by a candlelight procession around the church. As the lessons are read music is interspersed and the lights gradually begin to come on. This year the choir will sing music from many different periods and will be accompanied by piano, organ and with Annette Rico playing the violin. The service ends with a nice, big Magnificat. There are places where the congregation partici-

pates as well. This is the perfect way to "keep calm and carry on" and to prepare in a meaningful way for the coming of Christmas. Do try to attend AND ... bring a friend to share with them just how special Trinity is. The service lasts about an hour and twenty minutes.





What Is That Book Doing In the Columbarium?

Have you noticed a book suddenly appeared in the columbarium? What is it doing there?

This book is called a Necrology - a book of the dead. Specifically, this book is a list of names ordered by month and day of all the people who have had services connected to Trinity. The names were pulled from the burial records and entered in this new order. Trinity has records going back to 1908.

Some names are only partial because that is how they were recorded or because that was all that could be written down due to illegibility. Some names are missing as they were simply recorded as "infant" with a last name. Some names appear in pairs on the same date or near the same date. There are untold stories in these names.

The Necrology is open to today's date and is available so you can pray for those who have gone before. We may not know all their stories, but they were all part of this community of Trinity.

The production line is getting better every month. A few people came in early to set up the production line and pre-packed many lunch bags with a granola bar, a mandarin orange, and a small bottle of water. After church and coffee, eight sandwich makers started making PB&J sandwiches. As soon as a sandwich was done, a runner placed the sandwich in a plastic, zippered sandwich bag, and then added it to the lunch sack along with chips. Finally, the lunch sacks are placed in milk crates we picked up on Saturday from

ICS. Then it is time to clean up and take the milk crates back to ICS.

We are grateful for those who donate supplies such as peanut butter, strawberry jam, bread, mandarin oranges, granola bars and monetary contributions for stock items like the lunch sacks, water, and chips. We are also grateful and appreciative to those who chose to spend their time to make Sack Lunch Sunday happen.


By the time you receive this newsletter the cement slab will have been poured in the garden and will be curing. The contractor, Coast-Pro Builders started on Monday November 11 @ 8:00am. Thanks to everyone who helped fund this project to make our garden the place to be.

The next phase, after the concrete has cured, will be the actual building of the gazebo and placing it on the pad. If you would be interested in participating in our "Gazebo Raising" please contact Ron Smith our Warden. Many hands make projects easier. Also, if you have experience in building a pre-fab gazebo let Ron know as well.

A committee has been put together consisting of Mary Glass, Cathy Smullen and Sandra Scott to revamp, streamline and add new rules to our gardener contracts for 2025. This project is very needed and hopefully we will have it in English and Spanish ready for our Spring gardening season.

We will also be billing for 2025 dues in December for the 2025 growing season. We still have a few inground plots,1 garden table and several garden boxes available. Our fees are increasing from \$45.00 to \$50.00 to cover increased expenses and assist with other improvements to our garden. The Toymakers are making new plot markers for our in-ground plots and those should be ready by the first of the year.

Do You Know Lynda Pflueger??



I was born in Edmond, Oklahoma, a small town near Oklahoma City. The hospital was located above the town's movie theater. I used to tease my dad that he was watching a movie while I was being born. He as-

sured me he was not. He was pacing outside of the delivery room for hours like any normal father to be.

Economically it was not a good time in Oklahoma. Even though we didn't live in the dust bowl, jobs were hard to find. When I was fourteen months old my parents decided to join my mother's family in San Diego. Within two days my dad had a job as a welder at the Campbell Shipyard and my mother as a bookkeeper.

When I was three years old my father went through the police academy and became an officer. He bought a house in Clairmont and was the first person to get a phone due to his job. I graduated from Clairmont High School and then San Diego State College. Before graduating, I married my husband, Jon Pflueger. We had gone to high school together but didn't fall in love until we were in college.

After his freshman year, Jon joined the Navy due to the draft. His father did not want him to be a foot soldier in Vietnam. He became an electronic technician. I was studying nutrition and business and wanted to be a dietitian. But to do an internship, I had to leave the state for eighteen months. Jon had just been stationed at home and I didn't want to leave him. I decided to focus my career on business.

My first professional job was as Director of the Lemon Grove–Spring Valley Nutrition Center. The center was a Title VII meal program for senior citizens. It also included social services. The average participant was 80 years old. While running the Nutrition Center I gave birth to my daughter Karen Lynn. I didn't announce my pregnancy at first. One day one of my

gentleman participants asked if I was expecting. I told him no; I was hiding my Christmas Presents and pointed to my stomach. In a short time, half of the dining hall was laughing. It was time for me to make the announcement. After ten years I left the center.

I took a year off and then went to work for UCSD. Over time I climbed from an administrative assistant to a senior analyst. For the last fifteen years I worked for the Housing Dining and Hospitality Division. I worked with a great group of people, but it could get a little tricky. Like when I had to tell a division chief in charge of maintenance our director wouldn't approve his budget.

After almost thirty years, the death of my husband and father within seven months I decided to retire from the University. I gave six months' notice and volunteered to train my replacement. On April 30, 2012, the department gave me a big retirement party. All the division chiefs I had worked with on their budgets over the years attended my party. The maintenance chief bought me flowers.

I was glad I retired when I did. Two years later my grandchildren started to arrive. First Elizebeth in 2014 and then Emmett in 2016. I was able to take care of them until they went to school. During that time, I discovered Trinity.

Although I was raised Episcopalian, I attended the Baptist church with my husband. After he died, I wanted to go back to my original church. I heard a lot about Trinity and Mother Meg. One day I arrived in the church office and told Suzan I was an Episcopalian looking for a new home. After a look of surprise, Suzan smiled and gave me a church tour. The following Sunday I attended church and was greeted by Dennis, signed the newcomer book, and I sat near the front of the church. After the service Dennis made sure I met Mother Meg and guided me into the parish hall for coffee hour. Everyone was friendly. Before I left church that day, I felt I had found my church home, and I had.

One of my most rewarding times at Trinity was helping establish the Sunday School. We are in our third year and just held a children's service with Father Tom this month. To my delight we also had a successful Vacation Bible School this summer. I am also grateful to have served on the vestry while we were searching for our next rector. The vestry worked long and hard to keep things going and then a miracle happened. We found Father Tom Callard (or maybe he found us).

Along with my day jobs, I published nine young adult biographies. When my publisher Enslow, a library press, went out of business my copywrites were returned to me and I published two of my books on Amazon. The books are about George Eastman of Kodak and Thomas Nast the political cartoonist. I am also and avid watercolorist, enjoy reading, and studying the bible.

Haven/Turk Center House Dinner Ministry

It's hard to believe, but Advent is here (at least by the time this is published), and we are fast approaching the beautiful Christmas Season. And that also means the end of 2024 is soon behind!

Let's reflect a little on the great year we've had in this Ministry ...

We've carried on "rolling with the changes" that ICS has continued to make through the year at the Haven House/Turk Center shelter.

Late in 2023, we expanded our service by signing up to bring dessert to every dinner that we serve to the residents of Haven House/Turk Center. I think we are one of the few groups that do this "extra" when they volunteer. You would not believe how the eyes and faces of the residents light up when they hear that we have a yummy dessert that night. There are always exclamations of "We're having cheesecake?!" or "That looks so good!" or "We love it when you guys come to volunteer. You always have something good!". Whatever dessert we bring – cheesecake with cherry topping, or some type of delicious pie with whipped cream, or whatever it is – the shelter residents are always delighted to have this little extra pleasure with their meal.

And we are always delighted for a couple of other reasons. One is that we have a wonderful group of women who routinely cover providing the desserts for us. They "just do it", I don't even have to ask. If they see we are in need of a dessert for a particular night we are serving, they make it happen. It's a joy for me to go to the Parish Hall refrigerator on dinner evenings and retrieve four or five luscious desserts, just waiting for a trip to the Turk Center to accompany the meal. A thousand thanks to Gail Human, Jana Green, Molly Smith, and Petey Dietz for making dessert happen on a regular basis this year. You ladies are our angels!

And in addition to these four women, we have **generous donors** who have supported our ministry financially throughout this year, providing funds that allow us to purchase desserts for our dinners. This means we can provide dessert without having to always rely on

our "Four Angels". These donors have all asked to remain anonymous, so I won't put their names here. They all know who they are. And we know they are also our "angels". They make our Ministry continue to work smoothly. By their donations, they allow us to continue to be Christ's hands and feet, representing His love, and the love of the people of Trinity, for our neighbors who are without homes. We are enormously grateful to our donors, and we thank them for everything their generosity enables us to do.

Lastly, I couldn't reflect on the year we've had without thanking all the many folks who have volunteered their time to come serve the dinner at Haven House/Turk Center. There are too many people to name here individually. But I want to send a huge "thank you" to everyone who has volunteered this year. These folks are truly what makes the Ministry possible. Our volunteers give so much by being there and serving and interacting with the shelter residents. I think our volunteers themselves also get something special from the experience of being there. Many of them have told me so. A huge THANK YOU to all our volunteers. We truly cannot do this without YOU!

Speaking of stepping up and signing up, it's time to do that for the December dates we have at Haven House/ Turk Center. We have the second and last Thursdays of the month as our nights to cover the dinner service and bring dessert at The Turk Center. For December, we serve dinner on December 12th and December 26th – Boxing Day! That date should be a lot of fun. So, mark your calendars for those two dates, and think about the possibility of volunteering! We need five or six volunteers at each of our designated dinner nights, twice a month. Our volunteers need to arrive at the dining hall at the Turk Center by 4:00pm on our appointed day to help the ICS staff get ready for dinner. Dinner starts at 4:30pm and goes until about 5:15pm or so. We are typically done and headed home by about 5:30 PM. It is easy, fun, and so rewarding. Watch for the sign-up email comes out about 5-7 days prior to the dinner date.

We would love to have new volunteers take part, so think about whether this sounds good to you. But in order even think about taking part, you have to be on the email distribution for the sign-up. If you aren't, and think you might be interested, get in touch with me and I will add your name to the distribution. Getting the email doesn't obligate you, it just gives you the chance to keep in touch with what's going on in this Ministry, and it gives you the option to decide if you want to join in!

I am forever thankful for all the Trinity family who have volunteered so readily supported this Ministry for the past seven-plus years. May you all have a peaceful and blessed Christmas season.

Vestry Update

Trinity's Vestry met on November 12th at the Trinity office. Bishop Susan joined online for the first half of the meeting as part of her annual visitation. She asked us what was exciting at Trinity, and what our challenges were. People said they were excited about Father Tom, among other things. The big challenge was the projected budget deficit, which was around \$50,000 but is expected to go down by the annual meeting in December.

It was decided that a special committee be formed to address the deficit. The plans for that are in the works.

The Vestry also voted to move their meetings to the 3rd Tuesday of the month, which gives the Treasurer more time to make bank reconciliations.

As of November 24, Christ the King Sunday, Trinity has received \$217,880 in pledges from 59 individuals and families. We are still expecting pledges from several people who have pledged in the past. Please make your pledge for 2025 this month. We have had 11 people and families pledge to Trinity for the first time this year!
