A Message From Fr. Tom



Walking in the Light

"For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light." – Ephesians 5:8 (NIV)

January often brings with it a sense of stillness. The hustle of the holidays has passed, and the days remain cold and dark. It's easy to feel the weight of the darkness of

these winter months, but as followers of Christ, we are reminded that even in the darkest times, the light of God shines brightly.

The season of Epiphany, which begins on Sunday, January 5, is dedicated to the light of God. The story we most associate with Epiphany, the story of the Magi or Wise Men in Matthew 2, is all about their journey heading to the light of a star to encounter Jesus.

This Epiphany is a chance for us also to consider our own journey toward the light. As the year begins, we might ask, what does it mean for us to be "children of light?" What might that look like for us in 2025? Perhaps it means offering kindness where there is division, or perhaps sharing hope where there is despair, or perhaps trusting in God's promises when uncertainty looms. Perhaps it means we remember Jesus' words in Matthew 5:14: "You are the light of the world." Or maybe even sharing those words with others. Many people need to be reminded that they are the light of the world.

My prayer is that your journey, my journey, and the journey of Trinity Church in 2025 will be directed toward this light. I think we will be especially needed this year to be bearers of light to the world, for division and darkness seem to have set in, and we can be among those who bring the world something better the light of Christ.

Epiphany is a perfect time of the year to consider how we, in our own lives, are also on a journey. Each of us, whoever we are, walks with Christ as disciples, moving from point to point in the ongoing path of faith. Often I don't think we are aware that we are on a journey of faith. But we all are. How can we examine that journey? How can we learn more about our own path as followers of Jesus? That's one of the things we want to look at this year.

I invite you to pray this January for God to show you how you are called to be light. I invite you to ask God to show you how you can best journey with Christ. Stay tuned for opportunities at our church to reflect on the light and celebrate our faith and travel together as a community of love in 2025. 

Haven House/Turk Center Dinner Ministry

A Ministry By Any Other Name ...

I can't quite believe I just wrote that title above – the newsletter for <u>January 2025</u>! Wow, did 2024 fly by. But it was a great year for the Haven House Dinner Ministry. And we anticipate that 2025 will be just as great, if not even better.

I do have an update to share that also pertains to the title I wrote on this article. This will be the last time I will refer to this Ministry as "Haven House". Instead, we will be talking about our **Turk Center Dinner Ministry** from now on.

Many of you will remember that last year Interfaith Community Services consolidated the Haven House shelter from its original location at 550 Washington Street to the Turk Center on Center City Parkway. There were many good reasons for this change, and it seems to have worked well. I have kept referring to our Dinner Ministry as "Haven House/Turk Center", just because that was so familiar to our Trinity folks, and I didn't want to create confusion. However, it's been over a year now. The Haven House shelter no longer exists as a stand-alone shelter. Yes, there are still regular shelter residents at the Turk Center location, along with the Recuperative Care residents. But since there is no Haven House, per se, it is preferable to refer to the shelters as one entity, The Turk Center.

So that is how you will see me talking about the Dinner Ministry from now on, as The Turk Center Dinner Ministry. Just like the change of the year, out with the old and in with the new – or at least, a clarification with the new! Our Ministry is not changing, and we'll still be serving our neighbors who are without homes the same as we have been. As the title implies, "a rose by any other name ...", is still Our Dinner Ministry, same as always! Speaking of serving our neighbors, it's time to do that for the January dates we have at The Turk Center. We have the second and last Thursdays of the month as our nights to cover the dinner service and bring dessert at The Turk Center. For January, we serve dinner on January 9th (second Thursday) and January 30 (the last Thursday). So mark your calendars for those two dates, and think about the possibility of volunteering! We need five or six volunteers at each of our designated dinner nights, twice a month. Our volunteers need to arrive at the dining hall at the Turk Center by 4:00 PM on our appointed day to help the ICS staff get ready for dinner. Dinner starts at 4:30pm, and goes until about 5:15pm or so. We are typically done and headed home by about 5:30 PM. It is easy, fun, and so rewarding. Watch for the sign-up email comes out about 5-7 days prior to the dinner date.

We would love to have new volunteers take part, so think about whether this sounds good to you. But in order even think about taking part, you have to be on the email distribution for the sign-up. If you aren't, and think you might be interested, get in touch with me and I will add your name to the distribution. Getting the email doesn't obligate you, it just gives you the chance to keep in touch with what's going on in this Ministry, and it gives you the option to decide if you want to join in!

My gratitude goes out to all the Trinity family who have volunteered and all those who so readily supported this Ministry with donations and other support for the past seven-plus years. We are blessed to have such great support for this Ministry. Thank you!

Future Opportunity from the Samaritan Team

On the horizon the Samaritan Team is looking to be a Support Congregation for the Interfaith Shelter Network (not part of Interfaith Community Services) which organizes rotational shelters among the churches of San Diego County. On Feb. 2 - Feb. 16 San Rafael Parish in Rancho Bernardo is hosting an emergency shelter for no more than 12 unhoused folks who are screened by case managers.

The opportunities to help in a support role are varied: assisting with shelter setup and take down, providing meals, transporting shelter guests, preparing sack lunches on site, overnight hosts or weekend chaperones. Donations are also helpful to cover costs such as laundering, transportation and other expenses.

We would not be the only Support Congregation for San Rafael and we will be finding out what their specific needs from us might be. We have written descriptions of the different support roles to share with anyone who feels moved to get involved. Please do not hesitate to reach out to Jan McDaniel or Helen Joline for more information of if you would like to be part of this short-term ministry. We will have more about this soon!

Do You Know Jana Green & David Wilson?



I was born in New Mexico where my father was a 3rd grade teacher at the Sunshine School in Deming, New Mexico. We moved to Southern California a year later for my father to teach 6th grade in Blythe

California. We moved several times thereafter to other cities and towns in southern and northern California where my father retired as superintendent of schools.

When I was young, all I wanted to be was a horse ... one of those magnificent, stunning creatures of God. I had a passion then for horses and still do. I read every book pertaining to horses in the libraries where we were living and studied their habits and ways. I learned to ride at a young age at my great grandmother's ranch in West Texas the old-fashioned way, by my grandfather throwing me on a horse and me riding away by myself. Realizing at some point in my youth that I could not be a "horse", I decided that I could be a full-time equestrian and do competitive equestrian sports. However, I ended up being a parttime equestrian competing in polo, three-day eventing and dressage. I no longer own any horses, but I still sometimes think like a horse which has guided me in certain circumstances during my life.

When I was 10 years, I decided that I would become an attorney. I was one of the few women attending law school in the early 70's in San Diego. I went to law school at night and held down 3 jobs during the day to pay for it. I practiced for over 45 years mainly working for corporations and commercial developers in large scale regional shopping centers and renewable energy projects, such as wind, solar and geothermal. I am now retired as an "inactive" non-practicing attorney, and I love retirement.

I am a cradle Episcopalian but have attended other churches when there were no Episcopal churches available. My former husband (who was also an attorney) and I were married for 45 years when he died. We have one son, Patrick, and I am now "Maime" to two wonderful grandchildren. My son, daughter-inlaw and grandkids live in Iowa and are very happy there. My former husband and I raised our son in the Episcopal church, but Patrick and his family later converted to Catholicism.

We attended St. Peter's in Del Mar for 32 years and I was very active in the children's program, teaching Sunday school, founded along with others the St Tarius Children's Service Club, supporting the children's choir, wedding guild, altar guild and many other church activities.

After my husband died, I found a new Church home at Trinity. I have been with Trinity for around 7 years. I have been on the Vestry, been Junior Warden and Vestry Fellowship chair, helped with the garden, fellowship activities and Haven House. Presently, I am a Eucharist Minister and visit members who are unable to get to church as part of the Pastoral Care Ministry and on the Flower Guild. Bishop Susan once asked me what I wanted to do for God and I said, "serve others". Trinity has provided me with that opportunity, which I am very grateful.

Mother Meg married David Wilson and myself at my home in July 2020. I met David in a dance class in 2019 and we have happily been dancing ever since. We also travel quite a bit. Even though David is not an Episcopalian, he gives his time and money to Trinity, supporting Haven House, coffee hours, and the Flower Guild. David comes from a singing family; his mother and father were both singers and sang in church choirs, barbershop quartet and Sweet Adeline choir. David sang in the choir and with the praise team at his former church.

are heading home again.


Whoever you are, no matter how lonely,
