A Message From Fr. Tom

Dear Friends,



As many of you know, on January 21, the Rt. Rev. Mariann Edgar Budde, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, delivered a sermon at the Washington National Cathedral where she spoke about unity and the foundation of our nation and our faith. In her sermon, toward the end, Bishop Budde directly addressed President

Trump, imploring him to have mercy for those who are scared now, in particular children who are gay, lesbian and transgendered, as well as undocumented families.

As Episcopalians, our values come from the Bible which guides us. We do not have a single, united view of the Bible. Part of our identity as Episcopalians relies on the fact that each of us can apply our own reason and understanding to the scriptures. We can work them out ourselves. And when we do that, we don't always come up with the same understanding.

In every church I have served, we have had members not just from one political party, and people who do not all vote for the same candidate, and people who disagree about some of the fundamental aspects of our faith. Part of what makes the Episcopal Church great is that there is diversity of thought and belief. There is a wide path we walk, and we believe there is no one way you have to believe, or one way you have to practice your faith. We were made to have a broad umbrella.

Bishop Budde, in her remarks, addressed two of the biggest political hot-button issues of the day, immigration and LGBTQ+ rights. Of course, talking about these things directly to the President is going to stir the pot, because these issues mean a lot to the President, and they mean a lot to some people in our country.

In the days after Bishop Budde's remarks, two of those people reached out to Trinity. We got two calls from people who may or may not have been from Escondido, who likely found us by Googling us. Both of the calls were from people who were upset enough about what the Bishop said that they called some Episcopal Church. The first call came from a woman who accused us (and me personally) of bringing fentanyl over the border and said we have committed some horrible child abuse, although she was a little jumbled and vague. She was clearly agitated, and I wanted to understand what she was saying. I tried to engage with her in conversation, but she was not interested in conversing, she just wanted to be angry. After a few minutes of me trying to talk, I said God Bless You and I hung up.

Later in the day, the second call came from a gentleman. After I answered he said: "Do you know you are on a train to hell"? And I asked him what he meant, and he explained that we were going to hell because of what the Bishop said and because of our affiliation with this church. The phone call in the morning caught me a little off guard, but this time I was ready to really engage, and I told the man that I had no doubt about my own personal salvation. And I said - let's talk. But he, too, was not interested in really talking. He told me again that we were on a train to hell, he liked that image, and then he hung up.

Interactions like that don't really bother me, conflict is not a horrible thing, and disagreements are okay. I feel sad or better yet regretful that people's faith drives them to reach out in anger to aggressively confront strangers. Their practice of faith is closed to discussion. It is not a broad umbrella. And it distorts the image of Jesus.

The man who called told me that Jesus did not love but that he was a warrior. I would not necessarily put it that way, but if Jesus were a warrior, what kind of war was he fighting? He was fighting a war against the powers and principalities of chaos and division and oppression. In his day, Jesus was a warrior for hope, a warrior for inclusion, and a warrior for mercy and love.

While Episcopalians may not agree about everything, seeing Jesus as the presence of God's mercy and love is one of the things we probably do agree on. When it comes to current politics, especially these two hot-button issues of immigration and LGBTQ+ rights, I think we can all see that people from these communities live in fear. What the Bishop said is right - families, children, innocent people live in fear of what comes next. And mercy is appropriate. Mercy is compassion shown especially to an offender or to one subject to one's power. It is right, and Biblical, to provide mercy for those in your power who are afraid.

Mercy can mean many things, and a merciful response can take many forms. It is possible that the administration or the courts or individual legislations will find room in their hearts for mercy (and love), but it's possible that they won't. For my part, I will never forget that as a follower of Jesus, I have been charged with the care of Jesus's love and mercy, and that charge comes not because I am a priest, or because of my political affiliation. It comes because I have read the Bible and studied the Bible and found my salvation through the Jesus Christ who, in the Bible, tells me to

love my enemies (Matthew 5:44) and that the merciful are blessed (Matthew 5:7) and that we should be merciful, just as our Father is merciful (Luke 6:36).

We all have been charged with the care of Jesus's love and mercy, and these examples of not-love, of un-love coming as a response to Bishop Budde's sermon are reminders of how powerful Jesus's love is. It upsets people that God loves everyone.

I choose today to let God's love wash over me, and to connect me to those who are in harm's way who are the ones most needing mercy. I choose today to love those people who called me, even though I want to pity them for the anger and division in their hearts. You don't call strangers like this if you are at peace.

This is probably not going to go away. Political things will likely keep coming up. We may keep getting calls - only two so far. And I am committed to talking with anyone about political issues at any time, if it helps us all understand each other better and if it helps us find the love which is at the core of our beings, that which unites us across differences. So far, I am zero for two at finding unity across difference this month. But as a steward charged with the care of Jesus's love and mercy, I am going to continue to try. May you also find ways to practice Jesus's love and mercy in your life in what will be challenging and divisive times.

God bless us. God bless our Nation and our President. God bless those who are afraid because of their sexuality, their sexual identity, or their immigration status. And may Jesus give us all his mercy and his love.

Samaritan Ministries

This month, still early in the new year, is a good time to look back at where we've been and where we might be headed in the coming months. We've just completed Trinity's Annual Meeting, where we reviewed the results of 2024 and looked ahead to 2025 as a Congregation and for our individual ministries. But since a lot of you may not have been able to attend the Annual Meeting, nor gotten a copy of the Annual Meeting reports booklet, I think now is a good time to re-cap some of that information.

The Samaritan Team was re-activated in the spring of 2024, not even a year ago, after being inactive during the pandemic years. There was a lot of interest in getting this "umbrella" Ministry going again. Some of the main ministries of the Samaritan Team, such as the **Haven House Dinner Ministry**, were (and are) still going strong within Trinity. With support from Father Tom, we re-started The Samaritan Team in late April 2024. Helen Joline and Jan McDaniel volunteered to be the co-leaders of The Samaritan Team and to spearhead getting the Ministry re-ignited as a key Ministry area within Trinity.

The primary mission of the *Samaritan Team* is to identify, plan, coordinate, and execute the **Service and Outreach** Ministries of Trinity. We also have a focus on **social needs and social justice issues in our community**, for example, homelessness and food insecurity. But all projects taken on by the Samaritan Team have a goal of providing **Service and Outreach** to our neighbors, in our local area, and within the larger communities of Escondido and San Diego. We also have an intent to focus especially on the needs of Interfaith Community Services (ICS). This is for a few reasons: first, Trinity is one of the founding congregations of ICS, and we have an enduring interest in supporting the needs of the programs at Interfaith. But in addition, by working with and through ICS, we will be able to more easily leverage the efforts of the people at Trinity. We can amplify the resources we have available to reach a larger portion of our community. In this way we can more effectively be "Christ's hands and feet" in our community. We don't *only* work on projects with ICS, but it is a key source of outreach and service projects for us.

Here are some highlights of 2024:

We continued and even enhanced the Haven House Dinner Ministry, now called the **Turk Center Dinner Ministry**. Twice a month, Trinity volunteers go to the Turk Center of ICS to serve dinner and provide dessert to the residents of the Turk Center. The residents at Turk are neighbors who are homeless who have recently been discharged from a medical facility and/or who need continued recuperative medical care, as well as some general shelter clients who would have been part of the former Haven House. In addition to serving the food, assisting the residents during the meal, and helping with clean up and dish washing, in late 2023 we added the provision of desserts with each meal we serve. That simple part of our service has been a real hit and is a real asset to our service at the Turk Center. You should see how the faces of the residents light up when they hear we are back and have brought a delicious dessert! The smile of those faces as they go through the food line are a priceless reward for our volunteers! We now have an expanded number of Trinity folks volunteering each time. We have a group of women who readily pitch in and provide the desserts when needed. We have an easy sign-up process. And we have several anonymous Trinity folks who have generously donated monies to support our purchase of the desserts for our Dinners. This Ministry continues to adjust, "hum along" and get better with each passing year.

In June 2024, we started "**Sack Lunch Sundays**" for making sandwiches and assembling sack lunches for ICS. These lunches are given out by ICS to anyone who needs food, or lunches for their kids, etc. - basically anyone who is in need of a meal. ICS distributes over 300 sack lunches each day, so the need is huge. Thanks to the hard work and initiative of **Faith Much, Cindy Kratz, and Sandra Robinson** from our Samaritan Team, we now have a well-organized monthly "Sack Lunch Sunday" on the first Sunday of each month, right after church.

Initially we had a goal of making 90 sack lunches each time. Now we have such a well-organized process for gathering the donations of materials, and we have such an efficient assembly line for making sandwiches and stuffing lunch bags, that we typically turn out 120 to 130+ lunches every time!

Even better, that great assembly line brings in lots of parishioner sandwich-makers, and lots of sack lunch assemblers, especially the young people in our church (and notably, the **Sharp Family!**). It's a fun way for Trinity folks of all ages to be involved in a very worthwhile Ministry!

Thanks to the initiative of **Kim Billman**, the Samaritan Team now has a "**Creation Care**" Ministry as one of our on-going ministries. Kim pretty much single-handedly started and promoted this Ministry. With the help of the Sunday School kids, she also is the regular "maintainer" of this ministry, gathering up the recyclables and making sure everything gets to the right place. Thank you, Kim!

In August we joined forces with the Daughters of the King to start an on-going project to collect **Hygiene Kit items** (soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, etc.) for ICS. Feminine hygiene products are an especially big need. This was initially spearheaded by **Leslie Castillo** of our team. Leslie put a collection bin in the narthex, and we have been collecting hygiene items donated by Trinity folks and taking them to ICS. ICS uses them to make up hygiene kits for distribution to the community, particularly the homeless. The response from Trinity has been great – we regularly have a full bin of items to deliver to ICS!

Again, thanks to the efforts of **Kim Billman and others, Andrea Nelson**, and including **the Sunday School kids**, we have a beautiful, functional, and beloved "**Little Food Pantry**" once again next to Trinity's 9th Ave. driveway. The previous little pantry was in great disrepair, and we were not sure if was being used. The Vestry initially wanted to discontinue this effort and remove the little pantry house, which had become a bit of an eyesore. Thanks to some diligent work, of Kim, **Celena Lopes**, and others were able to gather info to show that the pantry was indeed being used and was valued by neighborhood folks who brought and took food from it. Volunteers were recruited to help rebuild the little pantry (Andrea Nelson did the "construction" part), The Sunday School designed and created the decorations for the outside of Little Pantry. And like a miracle, people who were neighbors but not even part of Trinity brought and donated materials and helped to get the little pantry installed, and looking beautiful and welcoming again. Kim has volunteered to be the regular "steward" of the

Little Food Pantry. Thanks to Kim and many others, we now have an on-going food ministry with our "Little Food Pantry" once again!

Our usual Advent/Christmas Giving Tree was back again in our narthex throughout Advent and Christmas Day of 2024. **Kim Billman, David Lewis, Marilou Kratzenstein** did the work to get our Tree up and adorned with lots of "ornaments" – tags that specified items that were in great need by clients of Interfaith. Trinity stepped up as usual to put a huge array of items around the tree – the Narthex was almost filled to the brim with packages under the tree! After Christmas, Kim transported all the "gifts" to ICS to be distributed to the children, families, and individuals who awaited them all. Thanks to the three folks who made this happen!

These are just highlights of things accomplished by the **Samaritan Team in 2024**. We have a lot on "irons in the fire" and ideas for new projects and ministry initiatives we can do in **2025**. Some of the **possibilities** include: being a "Support Congregation" for the newly re-started Interfaith Shelter Network (Rotational Shelter) in North County. We used to regularly host the "Rotational Shelter" in our Parish Hall, and this may be a way to "stick a toe in" to participating in some way again. We are exploring the possibility of helping start a "Humanity Showers" program somewhere in Escondido. We are looking for ways to partner with other churches eager to work with us, specifically House of Prayer Lutheran Church, on service and outreach projects that we can do jointly. And lastly, we may soon have a "**Sock It To Me Sunday**" project to look forward to! We think 2025 will be another exciting and fulfilling year of service Ministries. There is no lack of outreach we can do, and neighbors we can serve, because...**we are ALL Samaritans**.

Do You Know Patty Stein & Jonathan Cartford?



Jonathan Cartford and I (Patty Stein) have been attending Trinity Episcopal Church since 2006, just one month after relocating here from St. Paul, MN.

Jonathan is the grandchild of Norwegian Missionaries who served in Madagascar where all of his aunts, uncles and father were born. When not in Madagascar, they were furloughed to Northfield, MN which became an alternate home for them. Most attended St. Olaf College, a small Lutheran liberal arts college in Northfield, including Jonathan, siblings and various cousins. (I jokingly called it “St. Cartford’s” when we were first married.)

Jonathan spent second grade through high school in Seguin, Texas where his dad was a professor of music and worship at Texas Lutheran College. Despite growing up in Seguin, Minnesota was the Cartford’s summer home where Jonathan’s father and grandfather built a cabin on Leech Lake in northern Minnesota.

After attending St. Olaf, majoring in Religion, Jonathan spent a year as a truck driver and firewood cutter prior to entering Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, CA. My sister, Mary, was also enrolled there and is the one that brought Jonathan and I together. It has been 42 years, this year, since we have been married.

I am the youngest of 5 children, originally from Chicago but grew up in Denver where I attended nursing school. I was also baptized, confirmed and raised in

the Episcopal church. Extended family members include 3 pastors, 3 psychotherapists and 2 professional coaches. All the Stein children have been in the helping professions. It is likely what attracted me to Jonathan who eventually worked in inpatient psychiatric facilities, most recently at Sharp Mesa Vista in their mental health unit.

Most of my nursing career was spent in the operating room or adjacent to it as a medical products educator. I also worked at Scripps Health in Encinitas and La Jolla at Scripps Green in administrative roles.

My older sister, Terri, is a long time Escondido resident, aside from a 7-yr stint serving as a missionary in Europe with her pastor husband. Patty’s parents used to attend Trinity when they came to visit, as they were also Episcopalians.

Despite growing up Lutheran and attending a Lutheran college and seminary, Jonathan and I went to Episcopal churches (including our wedding) to this day. We attended St. Mark’s Cathedral in Berkeley, Grace Cathedral in San Francisco, and eventually St. Mark’s Cathedral in Minneapolis where both kids, Tom and Lucie, were baptized and raised.

Trinity has always welcomed us from the moment we attended in 2006. Our first experience with it was during Ash Wednesday and Lent, being especially touched by the sung Passion on Good Friday. Jonathan has always sung in the choir and when bells were purchased, played in the bell choir. Jonathan is on the vestry currently and is in charge of coffee hour. He has also consistently participated in Toymakers which spurred him on to take woodworking classes at Palomar College. Jonathan also sings in the Escondido Center for the Arts Chorale and serves on our neighborhood association Board.

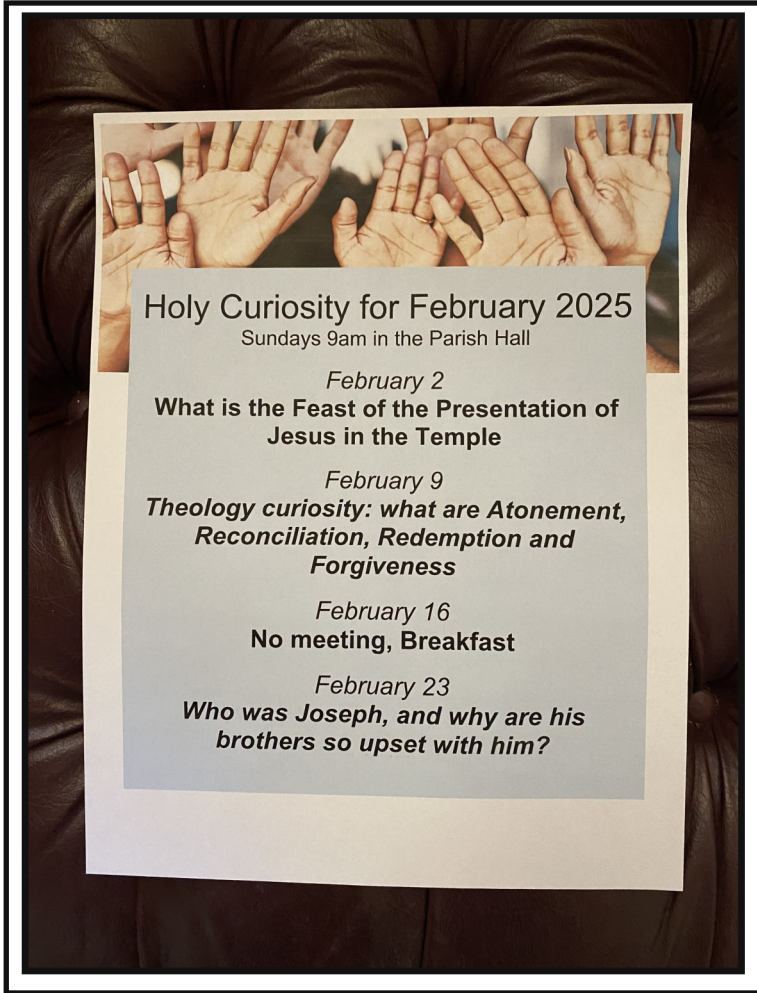
