A Message From Fr. Tom



Lent begins Ash Wednesday, March 5. This year as we enter Lent, I, for one, have been feeling a little overwhelmed. There is a lot to process about what's happening in the news, and things in our country and world are moving at a break-neck speed. We have a lot of uncertainty about what's coming next for all of us, and there are a lot of people around us who need prayer.

This is a perfect time for Lent. It's a great time for us to pull back from all the busyness of life and maybe even turn off the news for a bit and focus on the journey to which Jesus has invited us this Spring for these forty days of praying, fasting and almsgiving. I invite you to find yourself engaged in a non-complicated, spiritual practice that develops over these 40 days which will touch your souls in unexpected ways. Life gets very complicated, and keeping it simple is a great spiritual practice.

This year I am inviting us to consider the Lenten discipline of focusing on One practice, One person, and One Prayer at a time.

Start Lent with **ONE PRACTICE**, which is a spiritual discipline of your choosing, perhaps a fast, a special time of prayer every day, or something like saying the rosary or praying Compline every night. Our Thursday evening gatherings will be dedicated to five different spiritual practices and maybe you could find a practice there. Whatever the case, the invitation is to develop one practice which you stick with and do every day for a while, until you are ready to go onto the next thing. Try a few things, it doesn't have to just be one thing for all 40 days. But you are encouraged to focus on one practice at a time, and to stick with that one practice daily and repeatedly until you move onto the next one.

And then as part of your Lenten journey, focus on **ONE PERSON**, and this could be someone you pray for or someone you want to support in some other way. It could be someone from church or someone you know, whoever your heart calls you to pray for. It can be over-

whelming thinking of all the people we have to pray for and all those we would like to support. So you are encouraged to keep it simple by dedicating intercession and good acts for just one person. That doesn't mean you are not also going to pray for other people. It is just an encouragement to keep your prayers and your attention simple and focused on one person or one situation. And it doesn't have to be the same person for all 40 days. You can move on. Whoever that person is, just keep one person before you, in your heart, in your prayers and in your intentions.

And, finally, you are encouraged to dedicate yourself to **ONE PRAYER** at a time this Lent, which means you find one prayer you would like to hold onto, and pray and meditate on regularly, daily or even hourly. At one point in my life, I was praying the Jesus Prayer which goes "*Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner.*" I just prayed that one prayer repeatedly over time and it was quite powerful. I'm not sure what prayer I will choose for this year. I think picking that prayer is part of the process of making it my own. So, you are invited to find one prayer, or it could be one verse from scripture or one phrase that resonates with you. You stick with that prayer for a while, and then when it seems like it's time, move onto another prayer.

This is what my spiritual devotions will be this Lent, trying to keep my daily spiritual practices simple by following just one practice at a time, focusing on one person in my prayers at a time, and offering one daily and repeated prayer at a time. I will give myself to these these things until I feel like ready to move on, and then I will focus on what's next. And I will try to keep it simple.

If you feel inclined, I would love to know what you think about this idea, and, if you practice it, how it is going. I would also be more than happy to give you suggestions about prayers if you like.

Lent is a wonderful time of the year, a time filled with possibility and a time which encourages us to be active in the faith. May you have an active Lent.

There is great need for a visitation ministry. There are members of our church community who sometimes cannot make it to church on Sunday or to events during the week. Many live alone. Father Tom, Carolyn Richardson and I will work on a ministry proposal in an effort to make sure that no one is left out. This ministry will have several components which will include altar flower deliveries after church and Lay Eucharistic Visitors. Lay Eucharistic Visitors are required to fulfill certain training and reading prior to being given a License by the Diocese to do so. Please review here:

Annual Organ Concert

For over a dozen years, Trinity has hosted a benefit concert to support the American Guild of Organists Student Scholarship Fund. The concert donations help students, young and old, learn to play the "King of Instruments" and encourage them to consider becoming involved in church music. This is more important now than ever before as there are very few organists available to supply music for worship.

This year's program will be "An annotated concert"... meaning that it will be both entertaining and educational. The organists will be performing works from Bach to the 20th century with brief comments on how the composers actually use the organ. We hope

to inspire interest in both the music and the King of Instruments. The 50 voice San Luis Rey Chorale will perform a section of the concert showcasing the many, varied ways that the organ has been used as accompaniment. Choral works by Mendelssohn, Durufle and Handel will be presented. Students will be invited to sit beside the organ console to have an "up close and personal" experience. The entire audience will be invited to sing along for the Hallelujah Chorus finale. Coffee and cookies will follow.

A Note From the Altar Guild

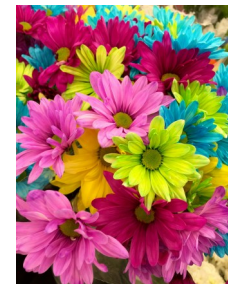
As I was writing up the Altar Guild Report for Annual meeting this year, I finished it and was thinking of other things I could have said to better describe the many things we deal with to set the services up – the regular Sunday services, the Wednesday healing service, the occasional Wedding, Baptism, Funeral and other special services like Lent, Palm Sunday, Easter, Christmas.

It occurred to me that many probably don't know that besides the regular bread and wine and candles, Altar Guild is also responsible for the Albs, Stoles, and Chasubles, for the priest, and Robes for the Eucharistic Ministers and Acolytes and also all the linens, like the fair linen on the altar, the frontal (that green or purple or gold cloth you see draped on the front of the altar), spe-

cial linen towels, along with the Chalice, the cruets that hold the water and wine, etc. Many items to care for and many items to replace as they wear out or to order for new members or the need for new items.

That reminded me that we have an **Altar Guild Fund** that perhaps everyone doesn't know about. Donations are most welcome. A donation to simply help or a donation in memory of a loved one to purchase a new sacred vessel or vestment would be a blessing to Trinity.

Samaritan Ministries

The Samaritan Team continues to be BUSY and productive! As we move into the season of Lent, here are some highlights of the activities we have underway this spring:

The **Turk Center Dinner Ministry (formerly Haven House)** continues twice a month, **on the second and last Thursday of each month**. Our Trinity volunteers go to the Turk Center to serve dinner and provide dessert to the residents of the Turk Center. These folks are our neighbors who are without homes, including general shelter clients and those who have recently been discharged from a medical facility and/or who need continued recuperative medical care. In March, our “dinner and dessert” dates are **March 13 and March 27**. On the 13th, we’ll likely have a St. Patrick’s Day dessert – fun! If you are interested in this Ministry, or think you might want to volunteer, get on our email list! Getting our sign-up email doesn’t obligate you to volunteer, but you can’t even think about it if you don’t get the email! “**Sack Lunch Sundays**” continue every month! Thanks to the hard work and initiative of **Faith Much, Cindy Kratz, and Sandra Robinson** from our Samaritan Team, we have a well-organized monthly “Sack Lunch Sunday” on the **first Sunday of each month**, during Coffee Hour. We also need people to sign up for bringing the “makings” of the sandwiches and the contents of the sack lunches, as well as other supplies. So, watch for the three ladies with their “clipboards” at coffee hours if you’d like to help out with bringing these items. And watch out for the next “Sack Lunch Sunday”, coming soon. **Our next sandwich making and lunch packing date is March 2**. It’s an easy and fun way for Trinity folks of all ages to be involved in a very worthwhile Ministry!

We are continuing to collect **Hygiene Kit items** (soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, feminine products, etc.) for Interfaith. Feminine hygiene products are an especially big need. So, remember all those toothbrushes and toothpaste you get at the dentist? Or what

about all the mini shampoo and other personal care products you get at hotels? Well, bring those and place them in the collection bin in the narthex. And we will deliver them all to ICS!

Did you know that the Samaritan Team continues to collect non-perishable food items for the Interfaith Community Services food bank? Yes, the “Souper-Bowl Sunday” drive may be over, but our food collection goes on ALL YEAR. There’s a wicker basket in the back of the church, near the baptismal font. Place your non-perishable food items in the basket, any time. This would be items such as canned or jarred food, peanut butter, cereal, soups, noodles, staples, etc. – anything that will not spoil and is NOT expired (please check dates – it gets thrown away if it’s expired). Twice a month the Samaritan Team picks up all that’s been placed there and transports it all to ICS. Thank you in advance for continuing to support the Food Bank at ICS!

And as for **the Samaritan Team** itself, we are always open to folks who would like to join us in identifying and developing new ways for Trinity to do Service and Outreach. The Samaritan Team meets on the **third Sunday of every month right after church in the Dove Library (starts at about 11:30, ends in one hour)**. Come learn more about the on-going Ministries and projects at Trinity that serve our community and our neighbors in need. Our meeting in March will be on **March 16**. So, grab your coffee and bring your curiosity and your IDEAS on SERVICE and OUTREACH. Everyone is welcome! Because we are ALL Samaritans!

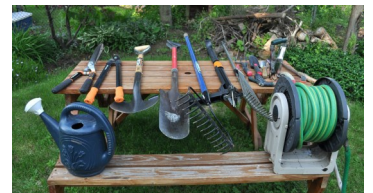



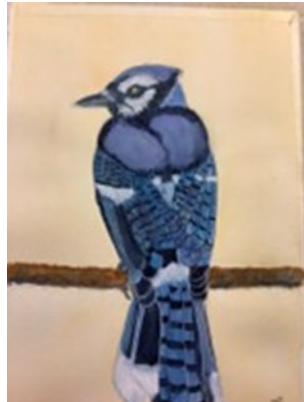

A Quick Financial Update On the Budget

As was announced at the Annual Meeting, Trinity was given a substantial bequeathment in the opening days of 2025. That bequeathment was not reflected in the financials presented, and Trinity was moving forward with a 25K deficit budget.

In February, the vestry voted to invest the funds with a new strategy for one year. If all goes as hoped, the income from this strategy will help us both this year and next year. The revised investment strategy should gen-

erate enough funds to cover the deficit and generate a little extra money to give us some breathing room in our very lean budget. If all goes well, and we can hold off some unfunded capital expenditures until 2026, we will close 2025 without debt.
